Session abstracts

Born-Digital Design Records: practicalities from appraisal to use

14:40-15:55 CET Wednesday 8th September

Born-Digital Design Records: practicalities from appraisal to use contributes to the intentionally iterative conversation about born-digital design records within the ICAM community. Additionally the session responds to feedback from the [Digital Architectural Archive Collections: Expanding Practices and Future Uses](#) session co-hosted in December 2020 by the Library of Congress and ICAM. While that session focused on the archivist, curator, and emulation technologist perspectives, this follow on event expands the scope and focus of the conversation by incorporating additional perspectives from both other geographical regions and other professional groups including academics and design practitioners.

The session builds upon the previous focus on the foundational concerns of collecting, exhibiting, and accessing born-digital design files, by concentrating on practical resources and guidance for approaching born-digital design records from appraisal and accessioning through preservation, service (supported access to by researchers) and use. Registrants will have the opportunity to prepare for the session by reviewing a short selection of pre-reading materials. Also, they will be provided with the link to the December 2020 session to refresh/familiarize themselves with the content and to ensure a shared vocabulary and understanding of the multi-faceted nature of born-digital design records.

How do architecture institutions transform in a post-colonial era?

15:00-16:15 CET Thursday 9th September

Many architecture institutions that are part of the ICAM network aren't necessarily (post)colonial institutions, but they have operated in a system of cultural colonialism and as a result they reflect a mainly western centric architectural history and a system of white power in architecture. Not much has done so far in challenging the national or international European or North American cannon of architecture.

But things are changing, our societies are changing, power systems are changing, attention is shifting. How do we, as architectural institutions, operate and anticipate. At the ICAM session of March 23 new tendencies and avenues were revealed: woman in architecture presented by the VAI, the position of Palladio in a trans-national world from Italy to the US to Western Africa by the Centro Palladio and a closer look to hidden narratives in an architecture biography by the Art Institute of Chicago.

Challenging Histories within Architecture and Design

14:10-15:25 CET Friday 10th September

Within the context of the past year and the ongoing health crisis and fight for social and racial justice, it is increasingly urgent to reconsider how our programs, research, collecting strategies, and approaches to archiving architecture and design can offer alternative narratives and perspectives; open up conversations and networks; broaden areas of scholarship; challenge histories; and ultimately transform institutional thinking and practice.

This panel looks at three case studies from Canadian Centre for Architecture (CCA) in Montreal; M+, Hong Kong; and the National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) in the Washington DC. Giovanna Borasi, Director, CCA will speak about *Centering Africa: Postcolonial Perspectives on Architecture*, a project that attempts to undo assumptions about modernity as endemic to the West, or as having begun with colonization. Shirley Surya, Curator for Design and Architecture at M+ will discuss building a collection to unlock new readings of the canon and embrace overlooked histories that serve to emphasize the transnational flow and network of ideas, and rethink assumed criteria and methods for research and acquisition. Michelle Wilkinson curator at the Smithsonian Institution National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC), will consider her work to collect Black architects' archives in a way that tells stories about design achievements, discrimination, community building, and legacies left behind.

Engaging meaningfully with issues of access, equity, inclusion, and belonging these three case studies look to expand understandings of the built environment, and in turn society, as well as offer reflections on the roles and responsibilities of institutions in the 21st century.
